Ozone Awareness Luncheon to Address Regional Air Quality

Northeast Texas Air Care (NETAC) Marks Beginning of Annual Ozone Season

Longview, TX, April 10, 2014: Northeast Texas Air Care (NETAC) leaders will join with state officials, federal officials and local industry leaders to mark the beginning of the 2014 Ozone Season for East Texas on Tuesday, April 22, 2014, at Maude Cobb in Longview at 12:15 pm.

NETAC Co-Chairs, Gregg County Judge Bill Stoudt and Tyler Mayor Barbara Bass, will welcome luncheon attendees. Speakers for the event include Russell Nettles, of Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, Eric Anderson of North American Coal-Sabine Mine presenting "Potential Impact of Air Regulations on Mining," and Jim Mathews, NETAC General Counsel. The luncheon will also feature NETAC's 2014 Air Quality Progress Report.

The annual Ozone Awareness Luncheon is designed to raise public awareness of air quality during the season that officially runs from May 1st through September 30th of each year. Throughout this time, Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) declares an Ozone Action Day whenever conditions are favorable for the formation of ozone at ground levels. On such days, local governments, citizens, and industry are encouraged to reduce or refrain from activities that emit ozone-forming chemicals.
